Title I is the nation's largest federal program for schools. It provides funding for increasing student achievement in schools based on the economic level of families in a school's attendance area.

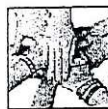
The purpose of Title I is as follows:

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### What can I do at home to help my child succeed?

There are many ways to help your child be successful in the comfort of your own home.



- Plan to eat at least one meal a day together as a family.
- Praise and encourage your child often. Celebrate his/her success. Focus on what they do well.
- Ask your child what he or she learned in school each day. **Check their agenda nightly.**
- Be sure your child eats a good breakfast and arrives at school well-rested and on-time.
- Help your child create a routine for doing homework by setting a regular time and providing a quiet place to complete assignments. Check your child's homework.
- Limit the amount of time your child watches television or plays computer/video games.
- Do fun activities with your child.
- **Every day tell your child you love him/her.**



### Parent Involvement While Travelling in the Car



We live in a mobile world, spending hours in the car getting kids from practices, to work, picking up from day care etc. Here are a few tips to help make that time more productive:

- Turn off the radio **and** use car time to talk with your child about what's happening at school, new friends, concerns, celebration, etc.
- Use this time to practice addition, multiplication facts. For younger students, use this time to practice colors, numbers, sight words, etc.
